Antioch Global University operates under the spiritual and educational oversight of the National Bible College Association (ID#VA2021009), an organization that supports churches, schools, and ministries in training, equipping, and mobilizing individuals for works of ministry. AGU is a religious institution and is not accredited by the U.S. Department of Education, nor does it pursue accreditation through agencies affiliated with the U.S. Department of Education or any international governmental accrediting body.

OPERATING STATUS

Antioch Global University operates under the corporate status of a 501(c)(3) non-profit religious organization and is authorized to grant religious diplomas and degrees.

Antioch Global University is a religious institution exempt from state regulation and oversight in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

BOARD

The AGU Board provides strategic direction for the University. Board members are selected based on the unique gifting of the members and the current organizational needs of the University.

Admission



NEW STUDENTS

Applicants for AGU certificate and degree programs must initiate the online admissions process by completing an online application, uploading a letter of recommendation. The non-refundable enrollment fees (technology, registration, & setup fees) will be calculated during the time of first payment. Other documents may include any official transcripts, copies of degrees, certifications, licenses, and other relevant documentation if applicable. All completed applications are reviewed by an admissions panel. Next step notifications are made via email.

TRANSFER OF CREDITS

AGU accepts credits earned at any accredited university, college, or institution, if applicable to the desired degree program. Official transcripts are required to be submitted before credit is granted. The credit will not be accepted if it has been previously used to fulfill requirements for another degree.

TUITION FEES

Unlike other institutions of higher education, AGU does not charge by the credit hour. There is a flat tuition fee charged for each degree level. There are no hidden costs or add-on fees. Tuition fees are subject to change. Payment options include a) payment in full or b) monthly payments (installment fee included). There is a 20% tuition discount off degree level courses for a spouse of students paying the full tuition price. **Discounted tuition prices for AG members only. Non-members pay full price**

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are provided based on the available funding on an annual basis. Scholarships are funded through private donations and sponsors. Contact the Admissions office for availability of funding. To receive funding, a letter of circumstances must be submitted along with a letter from someone familiar with your circumstances.

REFUND POLICY

All tuition received is considered a financial seed sown to promote non-traditional accredited Christian education therefore, refunds are only allowed prior to the first week of class per semester (**Aug, Dec, Mar**). If not cancelled prior to first week of class of new semester, you are responsible for the tuition for the semester. One-time fees are non-refundable.

OUR COURSES

It is our commitment to offer classes that are in line with the needs of ministry leadership. We believe that the need for more spiritual gifts in the Body of Christ presents both a challenge and an opportunity for the Church.

The courses offered by Antioch Global University will include content that is important to people who minister in and outside of the Church.

Degree Programs

BACHELOR OF MINISTRY (B.MIN.)

The Bachelor of Ministry is an undergraduate religious degree program designed to provide students with foundational biblical education, spiritual formation, leadership development, and practical ministry training through the AGU Literacy, Leadership, and Legacy Formation Framework.

This program prepares students to effectively serve within churches, ministries, faith-based organizations, and community leadership settings while developing the spiritual maturity, biblical understanding, and practical skills necessary for Kingdom service.

Students are equipped through theological instruction, discipleship, leadership development, mentorship, and hands-on ministry application. The program emphasizes servant leadership, biblical literacy, ethical leadership practices, communication, and organizational effectiveness while helping students discover and develop their God-given gifts and calling.

The Bachelor of Ministry program offers three concentrations designed to support various ministry assignments and leadership pathways:

Concentration: Biblical Studies

The Biblical Studies concentration is designed for students seeking a deeper understanding of Scripture, theology, biblical interpretation, and Christian doctrine. Students will explore both Old and New Testament studies, biblical foundations, discipleship principles, and practical application of biblical truth within ministry and daily life.

This concentration prepares students to effectively teach, disciple, communicate biblical truth, and serve in various ministry and educational settings with clarity, wisdom, and biblical integrity.

Graduates may pursue roles in teaching, discipleship, ministry leadership, biblical education, and further theological study.

Concentration: Pastoral Leadership

The Pastoral Leadership concentration is designed to equip students for leadership and service within pastoral and ministry environments. Emphasis is placed on servant leadership, discipleship, preaching and teaching, pastoral care, leadership ethics, ministry development, and spiritual formation

Degree Programs cont.

Students are prepared to lead with compassion, wisdom, integrity, and biblical understanding while developing practical skills needed to shepherd individuals, families, ministries, and communities effectively.

Graduates may serve in pastoral ministry, church leadership, discipleship ministries, outreach initiatives, and faith-based leadership roles.

The Church Administration concentration is designed for students interested in the operational, organizational, and leadership functions of ministry environments.

This concentration combines biblical leadership principles with practical training in ministry systems, organizational structure, communication, team leadership, program coordination, and church operations.

Students will learn how to effectively support and manage ministry environments while helping organizations function with excellence, order, accountability, and sustainability.

Graduates may pursue leadership and administrative roles within churches, ministries, nonprofits, educational programs, and faith-based organizations.

Degree Programs cont.

MASTER OF PROPHETIC MINISTRY

The School of the Prophets is the official training and equipping arm of the Community of Prophets, designed to prepare emerging prophetic voices for affirmation, accuracy, and apostolic alignment. Rooted in biblical foundations and led by seasoned prophets, the School provides in-depth instruction, practical activation, and spiritual formation for those called to the prophetic office. This is not simply a place to learn how to prophesy—but a place to be shaped, refined, and released into divine assignment with integrity and clarity.

MASTER OF PRACTICAL THEOLOGY

The Master of Practical Theology program is designed for students who want to deepen their knowledge in various areas of theology to enhance their vocation or ministry. It allows students to broaden their education in ministry and study.

These areas include but are not limited to Biblical Studies, History and Interpretation of Christianity, Christianity, and Culture, and Church and Ministry. Students who pursue this degree must complete and submit a Master's Thesis. The thesis research must demonstrate proficiency in analyzing theological knowledge and/or practice.

MASTER OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

This track equips aspiring educators with the skills and knowledge to effectively teach and inspire students of all ages and grade levels.. Emphasizing both theoretical and practical techniques, students will learn to tailor their teaching strategies to accommodate diverse learning styles and developmental stages. The curriculum includes methods for creating engaging lesson plans, integrating technology in the classroom, and applying formative and summative assessments. Participants will gain expertise in fostering a learning environment that promotes critical thinking, creativity, and collaborative learning, preparing them to meet the needs of individual students and support their academic growth.

Degree Programs cont.

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY (D.MIN.)

The Doctor of Ministry program at Antioch Global University is a 24-month advanced leadership and ministry development program designed to equip senior leaders, founders, educators, and ministry practitioners for effective Kingdom leadership, organizational development, discipleship, and transformational impact within churches, ministries, training centers, fellowships, and faith-based organizations.

Grounded in the AGU Literacy, Leadership, and Legacy Formation Framework, the program emphasizes spiritual formation, biblical leadership, organizational systems, leadership development, practical ministry application, and sustainable Kingdom advancement. Students are challenged to grow not only in theological understanding, but also in leadership capacity, strategic vision, mentorship, and the ability to develop healthy ministry ecosystems that equip and reproduce leaders.

The Doctor of Ministry program offers two concentrations designed to support distinct leadership callings and ministry assignments:

Concentration: Doctor of Ministry in Apostolic Leadership

This concentration is designed to equip and commission 21st-century apostolic leaders as builders, territorial stewards, spiritual architects, and generational mentors. With apostolic leadership often underdeveloped or misunderstood in many ministry settings, this concentration provides theological grounding, leadership formation, and practical training for individuals called to establish, oversee, equip, govern, and strengthen Kingdom works.

Students will explore biblical models of apostolic leadership, spiritual oversight, leadership development, discipleship systems, organizational governance, prayer, mentorship, and Kingdom expansion strategies. Emphasis is placed on biblical integrity, ethical leadership, spiritual maturity, global relevance, and long-term Kingdom impact.

Graduates will be equipped to lead networks, ministries, churches, training centers, and leadership movements with wisdom, structure, accountability, and transformational influence.

Degree Programs cont.

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY (D.MIN.)

Concentration: Doctor of Ministry

This concentration is designed for ministry visionaries, founders, educators, and faith-based entrepreneurs seeking to launch, develop, and sustain ministries, fellowships, Bible colleges, training centers, churches, nonprofits, and leadership development initiatives.

Students are equipped with practical and strategic training in leadership development, organizational systems, curriculum design, team building, ministry operations, discipleship strategy, and sustainable ministry growth. This concentration emphasizes transforming vision into structure and calling into lasting Kingdom impact.

Rather than viewing ministry solely through preaching or administration, the program approaches ministry entrepreneurship as the intentional development of healthy systems, educational environments, leadership pipelines, and community-centered initiatives that equip and empower others.

Graduates will be prepared to confidently establish and oversee faith-based organizations and leadership initiatives with clarity, structure, innovation, integrity, and Kingdom purpose.

DOCTOR OF THEOLOGY & APOLOGETICS

This program is designed to provide students with a deeper understanding of Scripture, biblical theology, and Christian leadership while equipping them with the knowledge, critical thinking skills, and spiritual foundation necessary to effectively articulate and defend their faith.

Through rigorous academic study, research, and practical application, students will demonstrate advanced achievement in biblical scholarship, leadership development, and theological understanding. As a culminating requirement, students must complete a 100–150-page doctoral dissertation that reflects original research, biblical analysis, and practical ministry relevance. Students will also be required to successfully present and defend their dissertation before a doctoral review panel

International Training Programs

Whether you are located in Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, or South Africa, Antioch Global University is dedicated to educating, equipping, and training students all around the world. We are currently offering the certificate classes to students in Ghana and Kenya. Fourteen courses currently comprise the Interdisciplinary Studies diploma.

CERTIFICATION IN BIBLICAL STUDIES

This 2-year course focuses on taking students through an in-depth study of the bible. Primary focus is on biblical history, OT//NT survey, and gaining deeper knowledge and understanding of interpreting scriptures.

CERTIFICATION IN PASTORAL LEADERSHIP

This 1-year course is designed to prepare students to serve as a pastor within their respective organization. It includes systematic study of church administration, practical leadership skills, conflict resolution, work-life balance, team building, and people management.

CERTIFICATION IN PRACTICAL THEOLOGY

This 1-year course is designed for students who wish to deepen their knowledge in various areas of biblical theology to further enhance their understanding of biblical principles.

CURRICULUM THAT HOLDS™

10-month teacher training certification for educators in non-public schools that focuses on enhancing pedagogy to support coherent curriculum design. Grounded in The Teaching Spirit, the program equips educators to align teaching practice with curriculum architecture, protect human capacity, and sustain rigorous, culturally grounded learning over time. Certification is portfolio-based and awarded through demonstrated application.

Academic Policies



ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Academic honesty, truth, and integrity are vitally important to advancing knowledge and promoting student success. All students and faculty of AGU must conduct themselves according to the highest standards of academic integrity. Students are expected to inquire about how to complete their work in order to conform with this policy.

COURSE COMPLETION

A grade of A, B, or C in a course is required for a course to be considered complete as long as all requirements are met for each course. Any grade lower than a C will result in an incompleteness for the course. An incompleteness is not considered a passing grade.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Course assignments, exams, and other graded work should be submitted on time according to the due date established by the instructor. If a student is unable to complete an assignment on time, the student is expected to notify the instructor by email as soon as possible. Special circumstances (e.g. death in the family, personal health concerns) will be reviewed by the instructor on a case-by-case basis.

ATTENDANCE

The instructional programs at AGU are based on a series of class meetings involving lectures, discussions, field experiences, special readings, and oral and written assessments. Therefore, it is expected that each student will be in attendance on a regular basis.

All students are allowed to miss one in-person and one conference call class session. A student who misses a class session is responsible for completing all material covered or assignments completed during their absence.

More than two absences will have a negative impact on the student's ability to pass the course. Students experiencing attendance concerns should contact their instructor to discuss their circumstances and the feasibility of continuing in the course.

Students with continued absences who have not officially withdrawn from the course may be withdrawn for non-attendance by the instructor with a mark of "W" before the end of the first 10 weeks of classes or may assign an appropriate academic grade at the end of the semester.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

Students need access to a personal computer (Mac or Windows operating system) and the Internet for major amounts of time for AGU academic programs.

The minimal software requirements for AGU courses is word processing software, such as Microsoft Word or Google Docs. Students are expected to have access to and know the basic technology applications required by their instructor.

A computer based webcam and microphone are required for courses that meet virtually. A cell phone camera and microphone may suffice depending on the quality of the cell phone. It is the students' responsibility to ensure the cell phone and microphone allow for real-time video conferencing and video and audio recording. Video cameras must be on during synchronous class sessions unless otherwise arranged in advance with the instructor.

COMMUNICATION REQUIREMENTS

It is expected that students are able to use and check their emails several times throughout the week for updates and assignments. Email is the official method of communication for AGU and your courses. Students are responsible for the consequences of not reading and responding to University-related emails and updates in a timely manner.

Students should be able to interact with their instructors and their peers using Canvas tools and any other software used in their course.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

All academic program requirements and financial obligations must be met before any certificate, diploma, or degree will be awarded. A student may withdraw from a certificate, diploma, or degree program at any time by submitting a written intent to withdraw from the program.
